Annual Report 2015-16

Program and Achievement during 2015-16

Contextual overview:

The organization has never lagged behind for the implementation of welfare activities in the sphere of women empowerment, health, education, environment, devolvement of child/ Youth / adolescent & rural area etc. However the dossier all activities were approved by the general body of "Savera Society for Human Initiatives".

1. Awareness drives on energy conservation:

Energy Conservation Campaign

While observing the "International Energy day" on 03.05.2015, An Awareness drive was launched at community level inviting the people and pry-members. The pamphlets on energy conservation in English, Hindi and Urdu languages were distributed among the community people on following concept. Energy is essential to life and key to human progress. Its conservation is essential to Modern Industrial Societies. As the population in our country grows and pace of urbanization increases, energy use is bound to increase. At present India is the fifth largest consumer of energy in the world.

Energy Conservation is a Practice for

- Ensuring judicious usage of energy and
- Decreasing the quantity of energy consumed while achieving a similar outcome of end use.

2. Eco-development program:

Saplings:

In order to recoup the loss of greeneries in community surroundings massive plantation in community lands and schools campus and barren fields was felt necessary for which pro-environment activities were initiated by the organization while observing "World Environment Day" on 05-06-2015. The community people were mobilized towards the plantation. All necessary activities like procurement of saplings, land preparation, fencing etc. were completed with the help of Members & community people.

3. Rural development:

(a) Income generating training to unemployed youths:

In order to create opportunities for self-employment and job placement, in favor of unemployed youth, specifically that minority community, this training was organized at a rented building. The Inspection was invited having good track records of educational qualification and experience. Computer and other accessories for learning were provided by the organization from its own resources.

4. Awareness drives on AIDS:

While observing the "world AIDS day" on 01.12.2015, An Awareness drive was launched in Slum areas in order to awaken the Community people about AIDS, as if AIDS remains one of the world's most significant health challenges, particularly in low & middle-income countries. Campaigning was carried out by different means with pamphlets, banners & posters etc.

5. Human Rights:

Seminar:

While observing the "world Human Rights day" on 10-12-2015, a seminar on Human Rights was organized by the organization, in order to aware the community people about fundamental Rights & Duties of every individual guaranteed under Indian Constitution.

Human Rights Day is observed every year on 10 December. It commemorates the day on which, in 1948, the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. In 1950, the Assembly passed resolution 423 (V), inviting all States and interested organizations to observe 10 December of each year as Human Rights Day.

"Our Rights. Our Freedoms. Always." aims to promote and raise awareness of the two Covenants on their 50th anniversary. The year-long campaign revolves around the theme of rights and freedoms -- freedom of speech, freedom of worship, freedom from want, and freedom from fear -- which underpin the International Bill of Human Rights are as relevant today as they were when the Covenants were adopted 50 years ago.

6. Conservation of Bio-diversity:

Seminar:

Venue: Office premises, Hapur

While observing "International Biodiversity Day" on 29-12-2015 a seminar on Biodiversity conservation was organized by the organization, in order to aware the community people about Biodiversity & its Conservation.

Since Bio-diversity implies 3 basic concepts -genetic, species and ecosystem which provides effective instrumentality upon the rural poor in their sustainable livelihood, conservation of bio-diversity is proved inhabitable among villagers. It is a fact of the bio-diversity is threaten chiefly is due to population growth, industrialization, excessive resource demand, introduction of

exotic species, atmospheric pollutants etc. Erosion of bio-diversity is due to socio-economic change of human society on following causal factors:

- Unsustainable production and consumption pattern.
- Human population growth.
- Globalization of trade
- Poverty
- Land use policies
- Poor governance
- Ineffective intersectional co-ordinations.
- Fragmented decision making.
- Loss of cultural identity and spiritual value.
- Insufficient scientific and implementation situation.
- Limited use of scientific and local knowledge.
- Poor understanding about role of bio-diversity.

During the convention on biological diversity in 1992, the genetic resources and traditional knowledge were often taken from community people by NGO's. Now the biodiversity conservation has been proved a spectacular form the small/marginal farmers who are now on continuing loss of agriculture outcome. Hence the maintenance of agro bio-diversity is essential on their part to adopt bio-fertilizers & pesticides instead of chemicals and the resource person have highlighted the process of maintenance of agro-bio-diversity. Which was file appreciated by the poor farmers.

7. Youth Motivation drives:

Seminar:

Indian Government declared January 12th as the National Youth Day in 1984. This day marks the birth day of great Indian philosopher, Swami Vivekananda whose teachings are the biggest philosophical asset of the country. The motto of declaring youth day on the birth date of this philosophical guru was motivating and inculcating these pious ideals to the coming generations.

Swami Vivekananda's birthday on January 12 is always celebrated as National Youth Day and the week commencing from that day is known as the National Youth Week. As part of National Youth Week celebrations, the Government of India holds the National Youth Festival every year. This is an

event of the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Government of India and is celebrated annually in one of the States in a joint venture. The youth festival aims to propagate the concept of national integration, spirit of communal harmony, brotherhood, courage and adventure amongst the youth by exhibiting their cultural prowess in a common platform.^[2] This is done by organizing gatherings of youth across the country and encouraging them to take part in different activities.

Crucial components of the National Youth Festival are the competitive events. To compete at the national level, the young talents perform their level best to get themselves medals and awards. To conduct these competitions, eighteen in all disciplines, a team of officers was deployed who managed the competitions, helped in creating logistical arrangements for smooth conduct of competitions, collected and collated the results.

The activities held during the festival include competitive and non-competitive cultural events, martial arts, exhibitions, intellectual discourses, young artist's camps, seminars and adventure programmers. The presentation of National Youth Awards also takes place.

8. Leprosy Eradication drives:

Compassion Program: Leprosy affected people need compassion.

While observing "World Leprosy Eradication Day" on 30th Jan, 2016, Foodstuffs and daily used items were distributed among the Leprosy affected people. An awareness campaign to eradicate Leprosy was initiated through Pamphlets, banners & posters etc.

While observing the "world day of Social justice" on 20.02.2016, A Social Justice Conference organized by the Society inviting the community people and pry-members. The objective behind the program was to inform the community people about the Sprit of Social Justice.

Er. Mukhtar Zahid, Chairman of Society In his inaugural speech said-

Dr. Ambedkar is the man of millennium for social justice, since he was the first man in history to successfully lead a tirade of securing social to the vast sections of Indian humanity, with the help of a law.

The term 'justice' in the Preamble embraces three distinct forms- social, economic and political, secured through various provisions of Fundamental Rights and Directive Principles. Social justice denotes the equal treatment of all citizens without any social distinction based on caste, colour, race, religion, sex and so on. It means absence of privileges being extended to any particular section of the society, and improvement in the conditions of backward classes (SCs, STs, and OBCs) and women. Economic justice denotes on the non- discrimination between people on the basis of economic factors. It involves the elimination of glaring in equalities in wealth, income and property. A combination of social justice and economic justice denotes what is known as 'distributive justice'. Political justice implies that all citizens should have equal political rights, equal voice in the government.

Advocate Nazim Ansari ,Senior Member of Society Said-

The term 'equality' means the absence of special privileges to any section of the society, and provision of adequate opportunities for all individuals without any discrimination. The Preamble secures at all citizens of India equality of status an opportunity. This provision embraces three dimensions of equality- civic, political and economic.

The following provisions of the chapter on Fundamental Rights ensure civic equality:

- a) Equality before the Law (Article 14).
- b) Prohibition of discrimination on grounds of religion, race, caste, sex of place of birth (Article 15).
- c) Equality of opportunity in matters of public employment (Article 16).
- d) Abolition of untouchability (Article 17).
- e) Abolition of titles (Article 18).

Know your Consumer Rights

In order to safeguard consumer interest, eight consumer rights are defined by UN Consumer Bill of Rights:

- 1-Right to Safety - safeguarding against goods that are hazardous to life and property.
- 2-Right to Information - consumers have the right to be informed regarding the price, quality, quantity, etc., of the products they buy.
- 3-Right to Choice - consumers should be provided with a wide variety of goods to choose from.
- 4-Right to be Heard - the right of consumers to have their complaints heard.
- 5-Right to Satisfaction of Basic Needs - this right demands that people have access to basic, essential goods and services: adequate food, clothing, shelter, health care, education, public utilities, water, and sanitation.
- 6-Right to Redress - consumers have the right to seek redress regarding their complaints.
- 7-Right to Consumer Education - the right of consumers to be educated about their rights.
- 8-Right to a Healthy Environment - this is the right to live and work in an environment that is non-threatening to the well-being of present and future generations.
